One addicts shares:

The misconception that life will get boring and monotonous without drugs is the work of the disease. The disease told me when I first get clean that life would suck from now on, life would suck without drugs. Then these questions came up, was it really fun when we used? Was it fun to be beaten, miserable and desperate, to barely be alive?

Back then I had a twisted, destructive view of fun, pretty much the closer to death I was, the closer to OD, the better that day must have been. It was of course not fun at all, but it was a way for me to hide the pain.

When I first got clean, I thought life would be meaningless because I'm in my 20s and I could never go out to party and have fun with friends, but when looking at the truth, I have never, ever been able to go out and have fun partying with my friends because I'm an addict, I was never concerned with having fun, I wanted to use! So, I realized those thoughts was the work of the disease that wants to take me back out there again. What I did not count on was how wrong I was, life is fantastic in recovery. When I got clean, I could actually start to live, be a part of life and even enjoy it. I wasn't desperate anymore, I was free! I could for the first time explore and maybe find something I enjoy doing, because my whole being wasn't centered in drugs anymore. I found new recovering

friends in the rooms of NA that I have fun with today, we enjoy each other, and we can communicate, have fun and laugh together and mainly grow together. When I surrendered to God and NA, I could have fun, freedom is fun!

Boredom is an enemy of recovery; an addict alone is in bad company. There is always something to do, always another addict to help. Just as everything we know about the truth is up for revision, so is our idea of fun. Recovery is an exciting inward journey that is everything but uneventful. When we really surrender and live the spiritual program of Narcotics Anonymous, our whole outlook on life changes. The things we considered being "fun" in our using were often synonymous with danger and escaping reality. Reality is really the biggest "high" of all. To be able to be present with our fellow addicts and our loved ones is so rewarding. Before we got to NA, we didn't know anything about how it is to live in the present moment. It's the change in our attitudes that changes what we now consider being healthy and fun. If we walk around feeling bored and indifferent, we need to take an urgent and close look at ourselves. What are we lacking? Usually something in our daily Program. We have the right to have fun. We don't have to take ourselves so seriously all the time. Don't forget to laugh, love, share, and do take the time to appreciate this present moment.



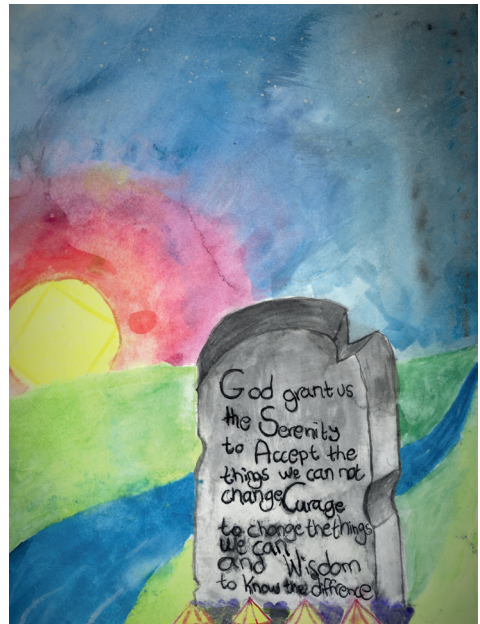
Dealing with death the N.A. way

Even if we came to Narcotics Anonymous because of the pain our addiction caused, by living the N.A. way we have not only been relieved of the pain we have learned to live. Through the program we are given tools to deal with all parts of life. We can deal with happiness, sadness and even death. This is one addict's experience of using the program and N.A. to process grief and go through the death of a close family member.

It all started when this family member went to the hospital and death started to sneak up on her. The moment I learned this I started applying the program on this. The first thing to do was to surrender to the fact that I am completely powerless regarding the fact that death is a part of life. This was easier said than done. My disease could see my pain and went to work, this feeling was new and old in the same time. All the times I have been sad about being left by the people around me, the people that had told me they loved me and then left, that came back. My disease started telling me that nobody would know what I was going through and there was no use to tell anyone. It wanted me to conceal this and hide from the rest of the world. I had surrendered but I needed something else, I needed to realize that there were powers greater than me that would want to help me if I only asked.

So, I asked, the first one I turned to was God, the second my Homegroup

members and my sponsor and in the end, I asked the entire community of N.A. for support and help in this. I realized there was a power greater than me that could help restore me to sanity. After this is only came naturally to ask those powers for help on how to deal with this and turn my life and will over to my God. I had to do this otherwise it would be too big for me to deal with, life would go on and if I would have dealt with this the way I have done in the past it would have ended in a relapse. My disease tried, it tried very hard to tell me that I needed something other than the program to deal with this pain. Because it was painful and it was hard, but nothing will ever be better by me using and that's what this program has taught me. Just for today I have been granted the serenity to



accept the thing I cannot change, the courage to change the thing I can and the wisdom to know the different.

Our Unity Lies in Our Diversity

Our unity lies in our diversity. "The greater the base, as we grow in unity in numbers and in fellowship, the broader the sides and the higher the point of freedom." {p. xi Basic Text, 3rd Ed. Revised}.

"Goodwill is best exemplified in service and proper service is 'doing the right thing for the right reason.' When this supports and motivates both the individual and the fellowship, we are fully whole and wholly free."

We hear a lot about unity in our fellowship. What does the word "unity" mean? Or is it just a word we throw around to get people to believe in our cause? We also hear the word "disunity" utilized in our fellowship through our continued-on page 5 service structure. Who is causing the disunity? The ones pointing the finger or the ones the fingers are being pointed at. Our Traditions tell us how to deal with internal controversy, the problems that may arise out of our inability to communicate with each other at times. The Traditions of the fellowship of NA are like the Constitution and the Bill of Rights of the United States of America. Without them we would be in slavery.

There would be no fellowship. Over a period of time, after looking back on our history, one must wonder if we have ever followed the Traditions. The controversy which seems to have always existed in the fellowship is just a way for the disease to manifest itself within Narcotics Anonymous.

The best way for the disease to exist is to divide us through service alignments, to tell us that we have the answers and that if you disagree that you are causing disunity. We do this in the name of group conscience, and group conscience must be right. After carefully reviewing the Second Tradition it was found to my surprise that it states, "We must be constantly on guard that our decisions are truly an expression of God's will. There is often a vast difference between group conscience and group opinion, as dictated by powerful personalities or popularity." [p.59 3rd Ed Rev.]

So we ask who is right or who is wrong? Does there always have to be a right or wrong? Do we have the ability to think for ourselves or do we need someone to do the thinking for us? I personally have no answers, just questions. The longer I stay clean, the more questions I have. Some of - the questions I've asked myself are, What are the solutions, who has them, do I really have to be involved to stay clean, why can't I be just like the next guy, do we really need the service structure, and if so why? Is there a way to change the service structure without being listed as a "disunity" ? If so, how? It gets really lonely at times thinking I am

the only one thinking this way, but I know it's a lie because I've had other people share the same experience with me so I'm not alone.

I think there are other people out there who are thinking the same thoughts I have had and just don't know where to go with them or just don't know how to find the solutions to fix the problem. I spent most of my recovery involved in the known service structure frustrated and finally got to the thought, maybe I am wrong and what is the use anyway. Maybe it's the time just to get along with my personal life anyway. Maybe I'm wrong and crazy. Did anyone ever have them thoughts? You're not alone anymore. There are other solutions. The Traditions are the answers, not the concepts.

The home group I belong to decided a year and 7 months ago that it could not participate in the known service structure, that if we were to continue to call ourselves Narcotics Anonymous that it was time we stopped negotiating our Traditions to go along with the status quo. The 12 Traditions are not negotiable [p.56 3rd Ed Rev.]. So why were we negotiating them? We left the Area we belonged to and found other groups who were also feeling the same way and formed our own Area. A solution. We started to serve the needs of the groups instead of the wants of the service workers. We decided also not to belong to a Region at this time and not to belong to the World Service Conference. Some will ask, "How do you get literature then?" Our answer

is that we print our own. It is the right of the Group. This might upset some people and cause great harm. This has not gone without notice. We also would like to thank all those who have been in support of us the last few years. Your support was needed. This also has not gone without notice. You let us know that we're not alone. Narcotics Anonymous, you are beautiful.

The Traditions are the answers, not the concepts.

More will be revealed.

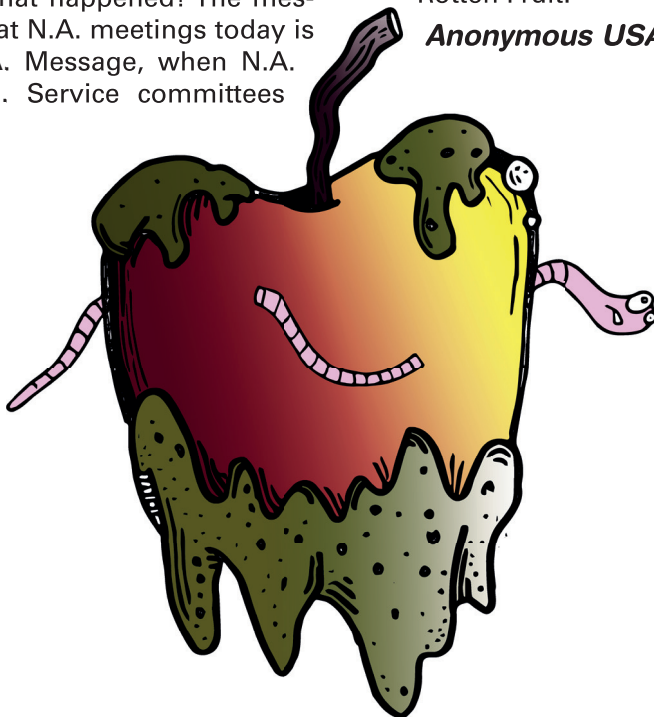


Rotten Fruit

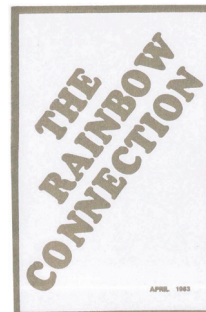
Road to Recovery

To remain drug-free for a day requires the desire to stop using. And the desire must be honest and come from within. People come to NA to solve their personal problems. They wanted to straighten out their lives but didn't feel the need to stay clean. Most of them did not stay with us because if the desire to stop using is not greater than the urge that calls them back to drugs, their chances for sobriety are small. The road to recovery lies in front of the one who knows there is nothing behind him to go back to and that to change his present situation, he must stop using. He is the one we can reach out to and help. He is the one most like us, not a lot of expectations and big goals, just the desire to get clean and learn how to live. And this is enough for the beginning, their religious or political views need not coincide with ours. In NA, we wish only to help someone who wants to help himself. The program

requires people who have the desire to stop using, because it will only work if a person wants to do something about their problem. Negative people or ideas will only hinder the beneficial use of the program for themselves.

The 12 Traditions of NA

In the Basic Text essay on the 12 Traditions Chapter 6, it states that “personal recovery depends on NA unity, and that unity depends on how well we follow our Traditions.” This is important for all of us to know and absorb into our very beings that this statement has been added to the Traditions reading cards that are read (hopefully) at every NA meeting. This is a fact that those of us who are really sincere about our recovery can never forget.

From the very first Tradition right through the 12th, what is the message that we are being given? What is it that we individual members, **MUST** do (yes, there are many musts in NA in spite of what you have erroneously been told) in order to insure our recovery?

Well, the whole thing actually begins with our 12th Tradition and the spiritual principle of Anonymity because we are told that “Anonymity is the Spiritual foundation of ALL our Traditions.” Next, we realize that we must even (always) put “principles before personalities.” That means especially our own personalities folks, not just others.

The language of the Traditions is really strong and final. It allows for no slack at all. There are no loopholes-always, every, never, ever, forever, are key words in our Traditions. The 12 Traditions are **NOT NEGOTIABLE**. It is really amazing to me that the majority of our members are either ignorant of, or indifferent to,

our Traditions, after all, they keep our fellowship “alive and free.”

Right in the First Tradition we find out that we must put our selfish interests aside and concentrate on our “common welfare,” because our very own “personal recovery” depends upon it. Next, we see that we must lead by example and in humility, no influence or control allowed. Our leadership must be based on moral and spiritual living so that we may attract those that want what we have without any need for promotion.

Anonymity and unity still rule as equality is the key in membership. No addict is excluded for any reason. In granting autonomy to all groups we ensure that the greatest number of venues, topics, and possibilities can exist so all different kinds of addicts can find it possible to recover as long as it isn't at the expense of another group or NA.

Focus, focus, focus, we are about one thing and one thing only! The recovery from the disease of addiction, all else is **NONE OF OUR BUSINESS**. This is so, so important that it is explored from all possible angles in Tradition 6 thru 10.

Our non-affiliation with related facilities and outside enterprises like other fellowships, treatment centers, clubhouses, churches, etc. is paramount. The possible dilution of our message is totally unacceptable. We must be fully self-supporting, so we owe nothing to no one, our freedom depends on this.

Our service structure may employ special workers (who may or may not

be addicts) and that structure is made up of service boards and committees, but none of these has the power to dictate, censor, or rule the NA group. We (NA) created them only to serve the fellowship, but they are not really a part of NA as a whole.

We have no opinion on outside issues and everything other than recovery from addiction is an outside issue. As effective promoters, as we all can be, that stuff just does not work around here. The only ones to stay are those who really want to change their lives because their old lives were unmanageable. The only thing that really works is attraction. If I am living in a moral and spiritual manner this will be easily apparent to whomever is really watching. They will automatically be attracted. We get this program by example, not by direction.

In the end (or beginning), as we become more and more capable of placing spiritual principles before petty personality issues in our daily lives, we become more effective channels for God's love. There is no better guarantee for recovery than working with another addict. This whole thing is about surrender and service people, isn't it time we got to it?

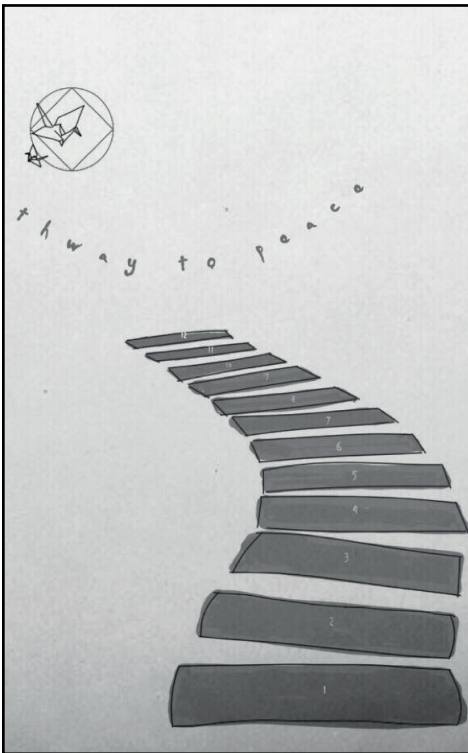
ing on the impulse to care for others and help in any way we can.

Negativity cannot generate stuff of its own, so it always has to find some positive effort to condemn or destroy. We, on the other hand, are as free to create and explore as anyone could want. We neither hate nor despise the poor people who have fallen to the traps of

egotism and control. We accept them and their behavior and exult in our escape from pettiness and fear. What does concern us is that others not be led into dissolution and despair by poor leadership and unavailability of study materials. People cannot be blamed for not knowing that which they cannot read and study.

We know that we have to each of us find a way into our own hearts and hold on to that peace and certainty there, born of our own true experience. While there is great beauty and joy in sharing recovery, we must each make this very private and personal journey within ourselves. All that God can give us is there awaiting our desire to know and be a part of life in all its forms. It is waiting for you and you have only to calm yourself and look within to know what we are talking about. The noisy cannot hear it, the busy cannot see it but the reality of higher power is there always, just beyond our field of perception. We can only acquire it with our surrender.

When we can do this, we will not go crazy over what world service is doing or not doing. If other members go temporarily insane, we can stand by looking for ways to help but we will not be drawn into their illusions. God will grant us a way to help and our path will widen and deepen as time goes by. Gratitude and sincerity are the building blocks of the new life. All that we need will be brought to us as we become ready for it, with more on the way. All we have to do is calm down and accept the miracle.



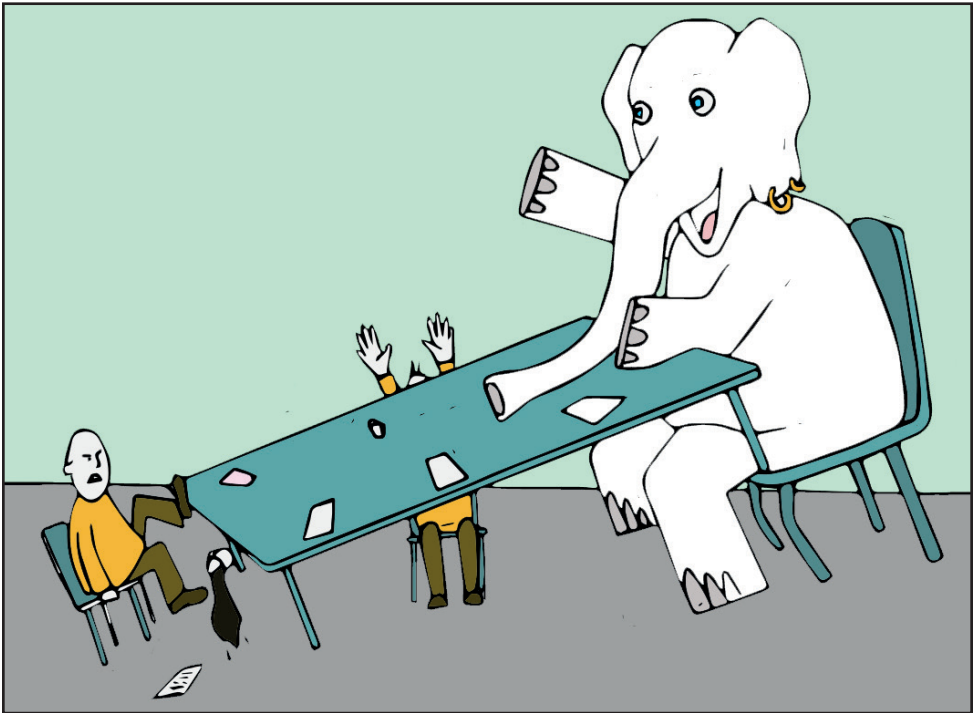

standing of what we were talking about. It went on to say a “white elephant” is “a troublesome or costly possession that’s hard to get rid of”. WOW!!!! when you put the two together it makes lots of sense and describes the issues that have been troublesome and costly in our rooms that are hard to get rid of that no one wants to talk about.

nence. After all who would mess with a huge white elephant stampede.

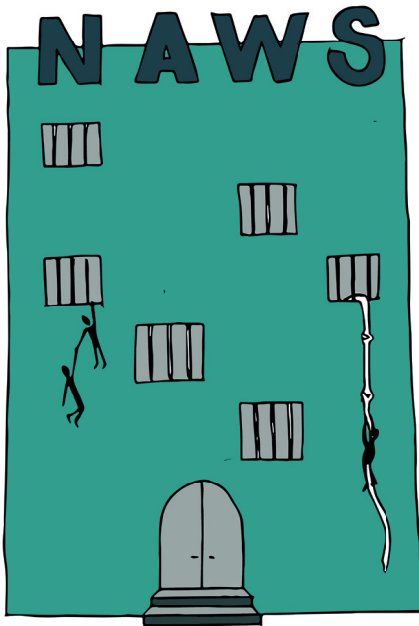

Escaping Naws

Sounds much like the TV shows when programmed people are rescued from a cult. My experience from Escaping Naws was less dramatical. For others, it may be more dramatical and even painful. After being a member of N.A. for over 23 years, something was missing in my Program. I went to meetings, did service, Sponsored members, worked Steps and Traditions and had a relationship with my God. I wasn't too happy about the N.A. message I was hearing at the meetings and from the service bodies we created. I thought it was me or the disease thinking, wanting to isolate me. I got on mass media and discovered there was a type of dissension taking place between two groups of members of N.A. One group was discussing corruption on what I thought was the highest level of Narcotics Anonymous, the naws corporation. The other group seem to be defending this corporate structure that I thought was N.A. I soon discovered from the debates and doing my own research that this so-called corporation did a corporate takeover on our non-profit Spiritual Fellowship. In fact, this office and its committees are not N.A. They are disguising themselves as N.A.; and fooling the masses in our Fellow-

ship. I also discovered that the N.A. Literature I studied and helped keep me clean for over 20 years was not written by us, but by professionals. I couldn't believe this other side of N.A. existed. It all made sense to me now, it wasn't me that was stagnant, it was the naws N.A. program and its meetings. I was no longer attending the Narcotics Anonymous that I first experienced when I came into N.A. in 1990. At that time, a lot of changes already took place that I wasn't aware of. No one was discussing anything at meetings and rightly so, but the service committees were also muted. I found out later that a small minority of members were against what was taking place at the world level.

The majority of members didn't care, some left, or most went with the flow. There was a cover-up to most of N.A. back then and including up to today. The more I studied our documented history the more I agreed with the minority; the members who were trying to uphold our Traditions and Group Conscience. When I began to Share this history and events that took place with other members, outside the meetings, I was referred to as creating disunity. Most stood away from us. I reached out to other's Traditionalist and didn't feel isolated anymore. These Traditionalists shared information and Literature written for addicts by addicts. Our HG, through Group Conscience, decided to use and study the Literature that was written by addicts for addicts and not professionals. Attention soon grew about our HG in the area we belonged to. The Area decided to take us off the meeting list as well as the area committee. My so-called friends that I've been Recovering with for years didn't want anything to do with me, even on a personal level. It was shocking and hurtful that because I wanted to study our Historical Literature written by us that I would lose close friends and wasn't considered N.A. anymore. Our HG grew smaller, and one of our members even lost her Sponsor behind her beliefs and choices. Since then more have joined us at our HG, mostly sponsees and the sponsor line. We study Historical Literature and are no longer part of mainstream N.A. and its service structure. Some of our HG members still



attend naws meetings because they have no choice right now. It's difficult Escaping Naws. One of them made the transition to only our HG meeting and two online Gray meetings. They claim that the naws meetings were not Sharing the N.A. message that we were Sharing at our HG. Escaping Naws is a process that only few will and can undertake. It involves challenging everything you knew to be True since coming into N.A. It's a risk that you may be ostracized by your friends and other members. It might limit the number of meetings you attend. It's about standing up for Spiritual Principles that others don't see or agree with. Helping others Escaping Naws requires a lot of information that will reprogram them. It requires time and uncovering a lot of buried Truths. Those who want to escape will have to know that there will be some consequences; some may be painful. Most of the results will be Freedom and a Creative Spirit. My and other members' Recovery, that are with us, seem to flourish. Our old Program wasn't working, this new Program does. We, with the help of other Traditional Groups, are helping others Escape Naws. The influence of naws agents surround us with their meetings and service committees. Some members stay with us, but the majority is influenced and programmed by the masses and leave. Having an open mind and searching for the Truth have made Escaping Naws a real Journey with more Growth and True Spiritual Principles. Finally, I know what N.A. Truly

is. I continue with the HG to Carry the True N.A. Message through Group Conscience. Come join us in Escaping Naws

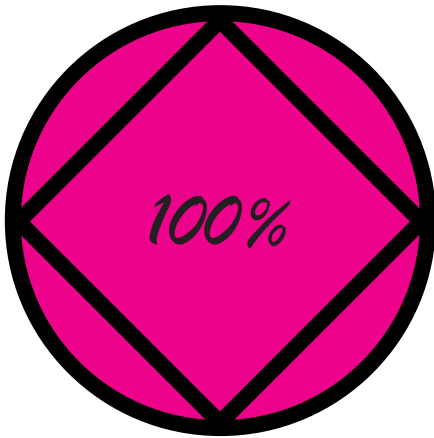


Superficial Message

I've heard this type of Message throughout my Recovery Process, in Narcotics Anonymous. I've heard members Share about their story and how they arrived to this Program. I've heard how through working the Steps and following suggestions how their life got better. I've always waited for the specifics in how they apply the Spiritual Principles of the Steps and Traditions of Narcotics Anonymous, but it rarely was Shared. Some Shared how "This Program" works for them and attending "These Rooms," saved their lives. They didn't mention Narcotics Anonymous or the NA Meetings by name. I've known a few members that went mostly to AA and Shared in this fashion, at a NA meeting. I didn't know what Program they were talking about. They had a very general Recovery Message, but from where.? I've could've closed my eyes and it could've been from any 12 Step Fellowship. I call that "Air Recovery" I need to hear an identifiable NA Message, that is different from all other Fellowships. I need to hear about our distinct Message of Complete Abstinence and Group Conscience of a HG. I need to hear about our whole Program, including the Traditions, not just the Steps.

That's only half a Program. I'm surprised this superficial message has kept me alive all these years. I guess there's something to having a God of Your Own Understanding, and a Sponsor to guide you. The longer I'm around the more I need a Full, Clear, and Precise Message of Narcotics Anonymous. The refrigerator has been unplugged for a while now, and it started to show Spiritual decay. HOW ANONYMITY IS THE SPIRITUAL FOUNDATION IN EACH TRADITION

"Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on N.A. Unity."

Anonymity is the critical ingredient in the first tradition, our personal recovery depends on it. It depends on unity, and unity is corroded by the egocentricity that is inherent when we are caught up in personality or individuality. Right from the very beginning the traditions point out to us the pre-eminent importance of anonymity. We are confronted immediately with the fact that we cannot recover by ourselves, the individual addict cannot find recovery in a vacuum, only in unity. Anonymity is our true nature, it is our name, and we are Narcotics Anonymous. Anonymity is clearly seen in this tradition. It is the force that drives away the ego self and fosters unity while nurturing our personal recovery.

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority, a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience, our leaders are but trusted servants they do not govern."

Here again it is really easy to see anonymity at the center of this tradition. No one of us carries any authority in N.A., even when we lead, we are asked to do so in an attitude of

humility and selfless service, not the usual one of fear based dictatorial control. God is the ultimate authority and in reality, our only authority and he manifests himself through the spiritual principal of group conscience. When our egos interfere, as in the search for power or prestige, when any one addict disdains anonymity and attempts to gain control, govern, or manipulate other addicts, our unity automatically suffers. We join a home group and become part of, our personal opinions, experiences and input become part of a group conscience. Anonymity is the key here again with the emphasis always being placed on the conscience of the whole group, not on the opinion or power of will of any one individual member. It is here in this joint spiritual action as we surrender our egos to the group that God shows himself. And where there is God the disease is automatically arrested, and recovery is then possible.

"The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using"

Here again anonymity rules as the lowest common denominator, no emphasis is placed on individuality. It doesn't matter who we may think we are (our image) or what or how much we used. Our individual characteristics or how much or little money we have are not important or necessary for membership, just that good old desire is all any one of us needs. We are brought together again in anonymity, grouping instead of separat-

ing, blending in instead of standing out, because we all have the same desire to stop using. We put aside our individual agendas in order to join others in a new life of service and anonymity. We must recover together and equality (anonymity) is the key.

"Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or N.A. As a whole"

Here we have anonymity expressing itself from the point of view of the whole group as a unit. Autonomy is critically necessary for each group to be able to function at its natural best and to have available that maximum flexibility for change while it carries out its primary purpose, it must have that freedom. But, as important as that freedom is, it must stop at the door of other groups. Even the home group is subjected to NA as a whole, to the spirit of NA, to the principle of recovery. It is group Anonymity that makes our autonomy possible!

"Each group has but one primary purpose, to carry the message to the addict who still suffers"

In order for each group to fulfill its purpose, carry the message of recovery, it must of course do that through the actions, desire, and example of its individual members, here again the ego self of the individual addict must subjugate itself to the greater purpose of the group. We can't keep what we have unless we give it away. All that is not given is lost. We must become channels for God's Love that is how we recover through God's Grace. The emphasis is again placed

on Anonymity, away from the importance of the self and towards the importance of the group. The needs of the many outweigh the need of the one.

“An N.A. Group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the N.A. Name to any related facility or outside enterprise lest problems of money, property, or prestige divert us from our primary purpose.”

Having been reminded of the nature of our primary purpose in the previous tradition here we are now warned of the possible diversion from that purpose if instead of remaining totally focused in our anonymity we were to dilute the power, purity, and energy of our message by endorsing or affiliating with other fellowships, clubhouses, treatment centers, etc. Vigilance is critical and made easier the more we adhere to the principle of anonymity. Maintaining our singleness of purpose without wasting any energy by straying onto the soft shoulders of outside enterprises of related facilities we insure the directness and success of our purpose. Individually we are more vulnerable to the allure of money, property, and prestige, but in anonymity, as a member of a group, drawing from the whole we become powerful and focused.

“Every N.A. Group ought to be fully self-supporting declining outside contributions.”

This tradition is our continuing reminder of the importance of remaining focused in order to suc-



cessfully carry a powerfully pure message. The group must operate in total freedom, we cannot afford to be influenced by any outside forces that would contaminate our message, but more importantly in the spirit of anonymity, no addict must be allowed to contribute more than their fair share. No addict must rise above the next addict in importance. We are all equal. We are all the same. We must all contribute equally to the wellbeing and survival of the group and the message that the group carries. Anonymity is even more important in this tradition. It is very easy and almost automatic to place old-timers on pedestals or to look down on newcomers as ignorant or having a lower level of recovery, but especially here we must never forget anonymity. We are all the same.

The responsibility for the support of the group must fall equally on all of our shoulders. This applies to monetary as well as all other aspects.

"Narcotics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional but our service centers may employ special workers."

To further protect us from the danger of confusion and dilution we now begin to be advised of the separation that exists in N.A. And any service center that we (N.A.) may create. This is necessary so that if or when any professional help may be needed to help us carry the message it must be other than N.A. That gets involved. N.A. As such or N.A. As a whole consists solely of the recovery meetings.

All else is not N.A. This is necessary so that our message is not tainted or diluted. Although some of us may be professionals in some other areas of our lives, when it comes to N.A. anonymity again takes precedence and we are all just another addict seeking recovery.

"N.A. as such ought never be organized but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve."

This is a further clarification of the same principle stated in the previous tradition. In any organization there must exist stratification and classification and this, of course, runs contrary to anonymity. Even those of us who are asked to lead, who have that capacity and possibility, we must do so only in the attitude of service and humility. We are always directly responsible to those we serve. Any time that we stray from this principal anonymity suffers greatly, the ties that bind us together begin to loosen and addicts start to fall by the wayside. This is why all of our organizational and professional efforts must be kept separate from our efforts to recover and carry the message, even the smallest underestimated influence could be fatal.

"Narcotics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues hence the N.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy."

Continuing to zero in on the importance of anonymity. Of course, as humans (and addicts) we have an

opinion on everything. We are just asked (warned is more like it) to keep them to ourselves while involved in a meeting or carrying the message in any way. The word never is used and never is a very final word. It means at no time. Opinions are nothing more than individual interpretations of a specific situation, they are based and rooted in ego and will sidetrack us every time. Anonymity on the other hand is based in egolessness and is never controversial.

"Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and film."

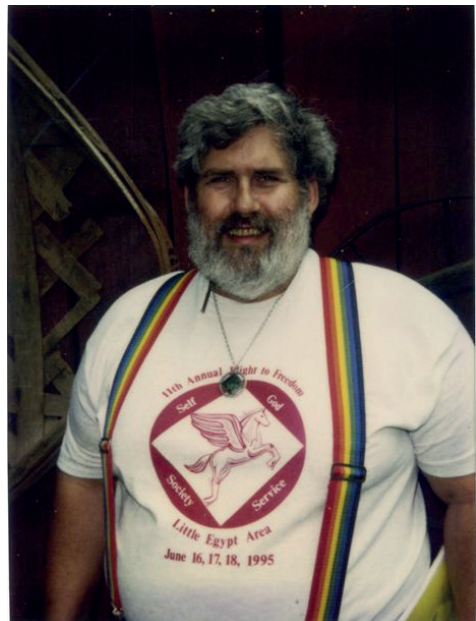
Attraction rather than promotion. Promotion implies artificiality whereas we attract those to us who want what we have because our recovery speaks for itself. The spirituality of our daily lives is evident to those who are interested, it is real. It is not our great personalities that mesmerize the suffering addicts, it is the peace of God shining through our sincere eyes that hooks the ones that are ready. It is the good will that emanates from our meeting rooms because of the anonymity, because we try to place principles before personalities, because we accept and welcome and try to love one and all.

"Anonymity is the spiritual principal of all our traditions ever reminding us to place principals before personalities."

It is in anonymity that we are

automatically welcomed and drawn into the We were God lives in our program that is why we call it our spiritual foundation. Every time we choose to uphold the principles of the steps and traditions in our daily lives instead of continuing to live the way we used to live controlled by our fears and defects, we are changing our lives, we are getting closer to the God of our understanding. Ever means all the time 24/7 and this vigilance is what will carry us to fulfill ourselves spiritually so we can pass it on to the next aspirant.

The Program uses 12 Steps and 12 Traditional Spiritually Based Spiritual Principles that can address all areas of our lives. We have to adapt to the Program, not the other way around. Our Traditions tells us that these Principles are just as valid Today as they

were when the Principles were first formulated. The World and Society have changed since the Program and Traditions were created. The fact is that these forces are really diseased based and promote money, property and prestige. This force promotes individuality between each addict which creates diversity and disunity. 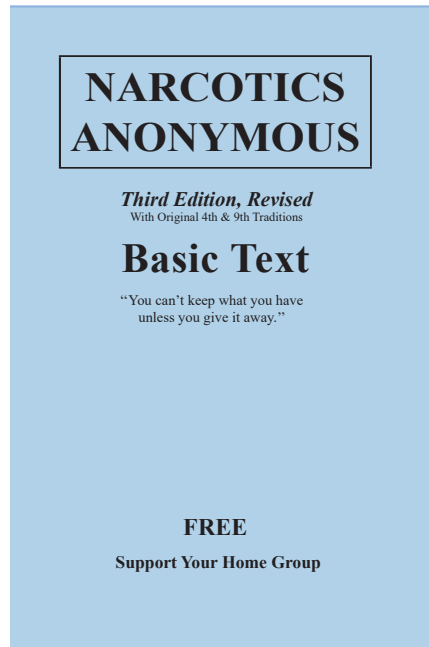

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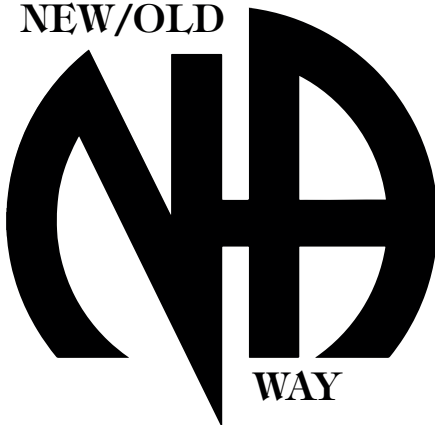
